ACHIEVEMENTS

- Strategizing the plan of using whatsapp to do this in a simple way
- Leveraging the Youth CAB meetings to introduce key concepts and give youth time to consider the questions before the mapping exercise
- Youth to work with a MScGH student in the 2023-2025 cohort and bring the findings back to T-AHISA and Ministry of Health



CHALLENGES

Youth CABs: We are new and not yet recognized in the community. How to link with other youth-based CBOs. Working through how to make our presence known and make our voices heard.

2. Finances: Organizing a system for transferring funds for the meetings and tracking spending from the grant to each site.

3. Sustainability: How to ensure our work continues beyond the life of this grant

 To conduct community outreach; engage in community HIV advocacy projects; appear as invited guests on radio programs; advertise our group to research community (e.g. NIMR; T-AHISA)

3. Conduct concept mapping to identify best area to focus our efforts and engage with HIV Implementation Science Researchers

- Members of youth CAB are both seropositive and negative and were approached from the Care and Treatment Center , youth-based NGOs, and from the social welfare office of the street they live
- Age range
- Gender balance was important
- In school/out of school

- To provide a safe place for youth advocates to bring unanswered health questions to bolster learning; to suggest research ideas based on community needs; to advise on youth related research results and what they mean back to their local community to develop health advocate.
